

INTERNATIONAL PROTECTION OF CULTURAL PROPERTY

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Course description

The course discusses the different aspects of the international protection of cultural property. After having a basic introduction, the students will study the main issues regarding the legislative framework: the different national and international legal sources (e.g. the 1995 UNIDROIT Convention on Stolen or Illegally Exported Cultural Objects, the 1970 UNESCO Convention), etc. The course is intended to be practice oriented so it is centered around the practical aspects of the protection of cultural property focusing on the crucial questions. The course materials include compulsory readings, case law materials and practical cases. All course materials are available on the Moodle site of the course.

Working method:

Students are advised to read the material in advance and discuss it in class. The materials for each class can be downloaded from the Moodle site of the course. All students can read the material beforehand and be prepared to explain it and comment on it.
